SCRIPTURAL BACKGROUND

To prepare your heart and mind for this week's lesson, read Genesis 4:16–26; Jeremiah 17:7–10; Psalm 51:1–6; John 3:16–21.

We saw the effects of sin begin to ravage the world and its culture in the children of Adam and Eve. The first murder occurred when Cain killed his brother Abel out of greed, jealousy, selfishness, and hatred. The Bible tells us that evil company corrupts good habits (1 Corinthians 15:33), and it appears Cain was quick to influence those around him to the evil in his heart.

The Bible tells us of Lamech—the fifth generation from Cain. His heart was corrupted and we know that he took two wives (Genesis 4:19) in rebellion to God's ordinance of marriage (Genesis 2:24). We read how he speaks with seeming pride of another murder—this one committed by him (Genesis 4:23). As the moral fiber decayed from generation to generation we can only imagine what the Lord saw as He looked upon the earth. For He was grieved in His heart that He had made people and knew that He must destroy them (Genesis 6:5–7).

And what does the Lord see today? More sin, evil, and corruption. Since Adam and Eve were sent from the garden, the sin nature that provoked them to disobey God has been passed on to all humans. The Bible clearly states that death spread to all men through the sin of Adam (Romans 5:12). In Adam all die—because of sin. But in Christ all shall be made alive (1 Corinthians 15:22).

As descendants of Adam and Eve, we have all inherited a sin nature. David knew that He was conceived in sin—an inheritance from Adam (Psalm 51:5). And Jeremiah reminds us that the heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked (Jeremiah 17:9). Our sin demands judgment by a holy God. Jesus tells us that judgment is coming. Speaking of the final judgment, he warns that just like it was in the days of Noah, so it will be also in the days of the Son of Man (Luke 17:26). He is coming to judge the world with righteousness and the peoples with His truth (Psalm 96:13).

So what are we to do? We know that our God our holy, jealous God—is a consuming fire who will not tolerate our loyalty, love, honor, and respect being placed anywhere else (Deuteronomy 4:23–24). He is intolerant of sin, and we are all sinners (Romans 3:23).

But thanks be to God who has given us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ (1 Corinthians 15:57). For God had always known that He would send His only begotten Son that whoever believes in Him would not perish but have everlasting life (John 3:16). Through Him alone are we brought from darkness into light, and from the power of Satan to God. Through Jesus our Savior we receive forgiveness of our sins and the inheritance of eternity with Him (Acts 26:18).

APOLOGETICS BACKGROUND

Man has always suffered from a self-centered arrogance that bristles at the very thought of being sinful at heart. Many truly believe that humans are inherently good and that it is unthinkable that we are born into sin. Couple this thinking with the self-esteem building rhetoric that maintains that we are great—we better know it, believe it, and be very impressed by it—and we can see that we are raising a generation that can't fathom that they are deceitful and wicked—that their hearts desire only to rebel against God (Jeremiah 17:9).

We tell our children to follow their hearts. Whatever they imagine they can do, they can. Their dreams are theirs if they only wish for them. Whatever they feel in their heart is OK—and they must pursue their heart's desire. However, this is not what God's Word tells us. We are leading our children astray with this type of teaching. Our feelings cannot lead our decisions. Our hearts are fickle and wicked. Our lives should be directed by Scripture alone. The Word of God will direct us in all righteousness. The righteousness of His testimonies is everlasting—with understanding in these, we shall live (Psalm 119:144).

Without a proper understanding of the depth of the sin in our hearts, how can we properly rejoice at the forgiveness that is ours through Christ? If our sin is minor or inconsequential in our eyes, what would make us turn from it and accept the free gift of forgiveness and salvation from God? If we long for the pleasures of our heart and pursue those desires without considering God's Word, how would we make Him the Lord and King of our lives? With our own needs and comforts so much in view, how would we ever be able to properly humble ourselves before God to plead His mercy and forgiveness? Do you see? The very gospel is at stake when we consider the selfesteem-building philosophy so many are buying into.

The Apostle Paul sums it up well this way, "For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) nothing good dwells" (Romans 7:18). We are sinners. Our righteousness is like filthy rags before the Lord (Isaiah 64:6). And it is only through humble repentance and belief

in the gospel of Jesus Christ (Mark 1:15) that we will escape the judgment and condemnation of our sins.

But the good news is that God promises a new heart for those who trust in Christ and thereby become partakers of the New Covenant (Jeremiah 31:33–34; Hebrews 8:6–12). We become new creations in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17), and can walk in newness of life, no longer living as slaves to sin (Romans 6:1–7).

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

It wasn't long after creation that sin entered the world. Adam and Eve coveted what they could not have and in direct disobedience to God went after it. God's judgment came upon them in the form of a curse—and they were expelled from the garden (Genesis 3:24). Their fellowship with God was broken. Now sin would be a part of the human race.

We know that those who are in the flesh cannot please God (Romans 8:8) and that in our sin we are lawless, insubordinate, ungodly, unholy, profane, murderers, manslayers, fornicators, sodomites, kidnappers, liars, and perjurers (1 Timothy 1:9–10). With this in mind, it is not surprising that just 1600 years after Adam and Eve were sent from the presence of God, He once again had to judge the sin of the world. This time, it was a worldwide Flood that would destroy all but Noah and his family (Genesis 6:13, 6:18). Sin continued to pervade the lives of the people.

It was just over 100 years after God destroyed the world that His judgment fell at Babel. The people were disobedient to God's direct commands and desired to build themselves a city and a tower to the heavens. They longed to make a great name for themselves (Genesis 11:4). These plans angered the holy God and He judged them by confusing their language and scattering the people across the face of all the earth (Genesis 11:7–8).

And man continues to sin. God is now withholding His judgment on the unjust—but it will come (2 Peter 2:9–11). He is coming to judge the earth in righteousness (Psalm 98:9). His judgment is real, eternal, and will come by fire. He tells us as much, "But the heavens and the earth which are now preserved by the same word, are reserved for fire until the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men" (2 Peter 3:7). But thanks be to God that we can escape God's wrath and judgment through faith in Christ (Romans 5:9; 1 Thessalonians 5:9).

COME ON IN

As student arrive ...

MATERIALS

□ Genesis 2:15–17 Memory Verse strip set in small plastic bag for each student

INSTRUCTIONS

Cover up the Memory Verse poster.

I am going to pass out Memory Verse strips. Each of you will get your own set. You should all know this verse by now. When I say "Go," open your bag and put the verse pieces in order as quickly as possible. Stand up when you have the verse in order. But don't start until I say, "Go." *Begin passing out* prepared Memory Verse strip sets until each student has a bag with a cut out verse.

"Go!" Students should remove their strips of paper from their bag and put them in order, standing to indicate they are finished.

Have some or all of the children recite the verse in front of the class by memory.

CONNECT TO THE TRUTH

Very good! This verse reminds us of how sin entered God's very good creation. And today we are going to talk more about that

first sin, how it has affected all of us, and how God has shown us His mercy.



💭 Studying God's Word

READ THE WORD

Today we are going to read and study from these worksheets. Pass out the Man's Wickedness/God's Mercy worksheets and pencils to each student. Assign children to read each Scripture as the class progresses. Students will fill in the blanks as you discuss the Scriptures. You can use the answer key from the Resource DVD-ROM to facilitate teaching the lesson.

EXAMINE THE WORD

We are going to be talking about sin—how sin came into the world, how it affects our hearts, and what God has done for us.

Observe the Text

As we read through all of these verses, we are going to ask questions about them and then fill in our worksheets. What we are doing here is observing the text by asking questions about it. Then, when we fill in the blanks on the worksheet we are repeating what the Scripture says in our own words. This will give us a better understanding of each Scripture. All of these verses relate to the same topic—sin. And they are found all through the Bible. *Refer to the Bible Study poster to review the principles of proper Bible study.*

Someone read Genesis 3:6. Assign a reader.

Who is this verse talking about? Adam and Eve.

Right, this is about Adam and Eve in the very beginning. This is the very first sin—they disobeyed God by eating the fruit God had commanded them not to eat. Have students write "sin" and "disobeyed" in the blanks under number 1. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

Someone read Romans 5:12. Assign a reader.

- How did sin enter the world? Through one man's sin.
- Who was that man? Look at number 1 for a hint. Adam. Have students write "Adam" in the first blank under number 2.
- What was the result of that sin? Death to all men. All men sin. Have children fill in the word "all" in the second blank under number 2. Have a student read the statement after both words are filled in.

Genesis 4:8

Let's move on to Genesis 4:8—number 3 on your worksheet. Assign a reader.

- Who is this verse about? Cain and Abel.
- Whose children were Cain and Abel? We've talked about that in previous lessons. Adam and Eve's children.
- What is this verse telling us about? The first murder. Cain killed Abel.

- Why did Cain kill Abel? Allow discussion. Should include that he was jealous, angry, greedy.
- **And what does that remind us about people and sin?** All men sin. Have children fill in the word "sinful" in the blank under number 3. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

Now onto number 4—Genesis 6:5. Assign a reader.

- What does this verse tell us about the people on earth? The wickedness was great; their thoughts were evil.
- **And what does that remind us about people and sin?** All men sin. Have children fill in the word "sinful" in the blank under number 4. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

Discover the Truth

- So what is God making clear to us in all of these verses so far? Man is sinful.
- And when did sin enter the world? Look back under number 1, in Genesis 3:6. In the beginning—with Adam and Eve.

That's right. It wasn't long after they were created that Adam and Eve were tempted and fell into sin. Then their son, Cain, sinned when he killed Abel—the very first murder. Then in Genesis 6 we read that men were becoming more and more wicked. Their hearts were evil. All sin angers God, and He must judge it.

Sin entered the world through Adam and Eve and since then all men are

born sinners. Refer to the Seven C's Timeline as you discuss when the first sin entered the world—it was at the very beginning.

READ THE WORD

But some people don't like that message at all! They don't want to hear that they are sinners. They think they are good—and that their hearts will always direct them to what they should be doing. That is not what the Bible says. Let's see what God has to say about our hearts.

EXAMINE THE WORD

We are going to go on to number five on our worksheets.

Someone read Jeremiah 17:9. Assign a reader.

Observe the Text

What is this saying about our hearts? They are deceitful and wicked.

Yes. Naturally, our hearts are deceitful. That means we can't be trusted to do the right thing on our own. And we are wicked—we want to sin; we don't want to do what is right. We would rather do what is wrong. The

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		Bible says we are sinful. Have children fill in the word, "sinful" In the blank under number 5. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

	?	What is the message here? It is pretty clear. Man is sinful. We are all sinners.
		That's right. The Bible tells us that we are all sinners. This is not easy for people to hear and it is not good news!
	?	What does God think of sin? He hates it.
HOLY JUST (Refer to Attributes poster)	?	And why does He hate it? Look at our Attributes of God poster and tell me what it is about God that makes Him hate sin. He is holy and just. Refer to the poster. Have children read the definitions off of the poster.
	?	Now look back on your worksheets to number two. What did sin bring to all men? Death.

That's right. And that doesn't only mean that we will die one day although that is part of it. But it means that because of sin, we cannot get to God. We are separated from God by our sin; and our sin demands God's judgment—eternal life without Him in hell. God must judge every sin we commit. And that judgment is death.



MATERIALS

□ What Would You REALLY Like To Do? situation sheet

INSTRUCTIONS

Read the What Would You REALLY Like To Do? situations from the situation sheet. Read both responses listed on the sheet. Have the class discuss what the likely response would be—what the children in the situations would REALLY like to do. The point is that we would all really like to do the thing that pleases us the best.

I have four real-life situations here that many of you may have faced. I will read them one at a time. Each situation has two different responses. After I read the situation and the responses, we'll discuss how the person would REALLY like to respond. *Begin reading the situations and discuss*.

CONNECT TO THE TRUTH

Do you see? If we are really honest, we have to admit that in each of these situations, the first response of the children would be to do what they really want to do—what would be the most fun.

What does this tell us about our hearts and our behavior? *Allow for answers.*

It tells us that we will naturally respond in a way that suits us. We would all rather do what we want to do—not what we know we should do. That's because we have a sin nature. It is very difficult for us to do the right things on our own. We want to have fun and often that means sinning against God.

Our hearts are naturally wicked, just like the Bible says.



READ THE WORD

It seems like things just keep getting worse, doesn't it? Take a look at your worksheets. We have read in the Bible that sin entered the world at the very beginning, and we are still sinners. We don't want to do what we know we should do and we want to do what we know we should not do! And we know that God must punish every sin we commit! He hates our sin. So, where does that leave us? It doesn't look good—but let's find out.

EXAMINE THE WORD

Let's go back to the worksheet and on to number 8.

Someone read John 3:16. Assign a reader.

Observe the Text

- Who is this verse about? There are three different answers. God, Jesus, believers.
- What did God do? Gave His only Son, Jesus.
- Why did He do that? He loved the world.

John 3:16

- **What did the Son, Jesus, do for the believers?** Provided a way for eternal life so they would not perish.
- Why would we perish? Think about what we have been talking about all morning. Look at your worksheets. *We are all sinners*.

God gave His Son, Jesus, so that those who believe in Him would have everlasting life and not perish because of their sins. Have children fill in the word "believe" in the blank under number 8. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

2 Corinthians 5:17

Someone read 2 Corinthians 5:17—number 9 on the worksheet. Assign a reader.

- First of all, someone tell me what it is all people are born with? It was passed on to us from Adam. *A sin nature.*
- That's right—a sin nature. But what does this verse say about our "old things"—our sin nature? It will pass away.
- How does it pass away? By being in Christ.
- **?** And what happens to us when we are in Christ? We become a new creation.

Yes—a new creation. And as a new creation what we want slowly begins to change. God give us a new heart and with His power we can begin to have victory over sin. We don't really want to sin against God anymore. We want to do what God wants us to do. But we can't begin to change without Jesus Christ, because we are sinners and not able to do good on our own.

So, we will fill in the worksheet. In Jesus Christ our hearts can be made **new.** Have children fill in the word "new" in the blank under, number 9. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

Let's read 2 Corinthians 5:21—number 10 on the worksheet. Assign a reader.

2 Corinthians 5:21

Who is this verse talking about? Allow for answers.

Let's see. It says "He made Him" doesn't it? That refers to God (He) made Jesus (Him). So this verse is saying that God made Jesus to be sin for us so that we might be made righteous before God.

Who knows what it means that we might be made righteous? Allow for answers.

It means that Jesus, even though He never sinned, was punished for all the sins of His people. In other words, in order to show His love for us, God treated Jesus as though He were a sinner—but He never sinned!

Jesus died in the place of His people to pay the penalty of the sins of believers. When He did that, He was offering forgiveness to all who would repent of their sins, believe in Him, and trust Him. There are no works we can do to get this forgiveness. But we must understand that our sins anger God, and we must trust in Jesus. The forgiveness God offers through Jesus is given completely because of what Jesus did when He died on the Cross. Have children fill in the word "saved" in the blank under number 10. Have a student read the statement after the word is filled in.

Discover the Truth

Do you see the same message coming clear in these verses like before? What is it? Allow for answers.

Even though we are wicked sinners and God hates sin, He showed His love and mercy to us by sending Jesus Christ to earth. Jesus never sinned not ever. Jesus came to suffer and die so that whoever would repent and believe in Him would have everlasting life. We can be saved through Jesus Christ alone.

Through Jesus, God shows amazing mercy and love. Will someone read from the Attributes of God poster what we mean when we say God is merciful. *Kind to those in misery; withholds deserved punishment.*

And someone read what we mean when we say that God is love. Always wants what is best for His children.

God is merciful in that He shows kindness to us as sinners. As sinners we are in misery, in distress, and suffering. We may not know it, but we are because sin keeps us from God. And sin will finally lead to hell unless we repent and accept the free gift of forgiveness that God offers in Jesus Christ.

God shows so much love in Jesus Christ. He wants what is best for His children. And the very best thing God can give us is to be children of God, to be forgiven of our sins, and to know that because of Jesus's suffering,

and because of our faith in Him, our sins are forgiven and we will one day live in heaven forever with Him!





WHAT YOU HEARD IN THE WORD

Well, we started off with some pretty bad news today. Sin entered the world at the very beginning—in the Garden of Eden with Adam and Eve. This sin nature passed to all people through Adam. All men sin and are disobedient to God. This is just the way our hearts naturally are—deceitful and wicked. The Bible confirms that truth in many places.

The fact that we are all sinners seems like very bad news, doesn't it? Yet, there is really good news. God sent His only son, Jesus, into the world so that whoever believes in Him can have a relationship with God. Jesus's sacrifice on the Cross paid the penalty of death for everyone who will repent and believe in Him. Without Jesus, we all are separated from God.

But through true repentance and faith in Jesus, we can have everlasting fellowship with God and eternal life.

To review what God has done for us, let's read the main point statements on numbers 8, 9, and 10 from the worksheets. Assign students to read the main point statements for 8, 9, and 10 on the worksheets.

I'd like you to take your worksheets home and share this information with your family. It is bad news about our sinful natures . . . but great news about God's love and mercy in Jesus Christ!

GOD'S WORD IN THE REAL WORLD

I said earlier that people just don't want to hear that their hearts are wicked. The world teaches us something completely different. When it comes to our hearts, we sure hear a different message.

We often hear that it is OK to just follow our hearts wherever they lead. We are told that we can do anything our hearts desire and we must do that in order to be really happy! But this is not what the Bible teaches.

The Bible teaches that if we are left to ourselves we will always sin against God. We must not let our hearts lead us, but we must let the Word of God lead us. It tells us that it is only through Jesus Christ that our hearts can be made right. If we follow our hearts where we want to go, without the guidance of God's Word, we will get into trouble. So we must stand on

God's Word and live according to His Word—knowing that without Jesus Christ, our hearts can never lead us in the right direction.
