Nineveh Script

Characters: Reporter, Nadine of Nineveh, Nolan of Nineveh

Props: Something for the reporter to use as a microphone: a pencil, a hairbrush, a ruler.

Reporter: Hello. This is ______(student's name) from Off the Hook Press reporting live from Nineveh. I'm interviewing people on the street to see if we can understand what has happened.

Reporter: (Motioning to one of the Ninevites to come over) **Yes. Here's someone now. Thank you for talking to us, Nadine. This is Nadine of Nineveh.**

Nadine: Thank you for having me on.

Reporter: Nadine, what is Nineveh like? You've been a citizen here all your life, I believe. Tell me about your city.

Nadine: Sure. Nineveh is a very large city with a population of more than 120,000. It's really large. Let me put it this way. If you were to walk through our city from end to end, it would take you three days!

Reporter: This is a big city. What else can you tell me about your city, Nadine?

Nadine: Well, up until recently the people here could be described as evil and violent. Yes, I'm sorry to say, those words described our city.

Reporter: I see. That's what I wanted to get to, Nadine. You said "up until recently." What happened to change all that?
