Real World Skit: Wondering About Wisdom

Characters: Jo, Tori, and Lizzy

Props: Markers, index cards, a spiral notebook, a pen, a few books piled on the table to look like resources.

Jo and Lizzy are sitting at a table in the library working quietly when Tori enters holding markers and index cards.

Jo: (whispering loudly and waving) **Tori, Tori, we're over here!**

Tori: (whispering loudly) Oh, hey! There you are.

Lizzy: You're late again. Where have you been? We can't be expected to do this project for you.

Tori: I'm sorry. I was getting the index cards and markers that you asked me to pick up. Then we ran into bad traffic on the way home. I'm sorry. Did you get a lot done without me?

Jo: We gathered some data and organized it. (Jo holds up the spiral notebook proudly displaying their work)

Lizzy: Yeah, see? In this column we wrote where we can get information and gain knowledge. You know, like school, books, magazines, the Internet, personal experiences...

Jo: And in this column we wrote the benefits of getting a formal education and going to college—like jobs, money, power, popularity, and wisdom. We still need to make some graphs and labels and stuff to go on our board.

Tori: (hesitantly) **Oh. Ummmm. I see.**

Lizzy: There's still a lot to do, Tori. Don't worry.

Tori: I'm not worried. But can I see your lists for a second? I just want to take a closer look.

Lizzy: Sure, here. Can you hand me those markers?

(Tori hands Lizzy the markers and reads over the lists)

Tori: I see some problems here. Can I make some suggestions?

Tori: No. The lists are great. But you said that wisdom can come from getting a formal education.

Lizzy: That's right. What's wrong with that?

Tori: Well, wisdom isn't something you get from a fancy university or a college degree. There is only one source for real wisdom, and I don't see that listed here.

(Jo and Tori look at each other in surprise)

Jo: Are you kidding me? What did we miss?

Tori: The Bible. God is the source of all wisdom.

Lizzy: Hmmm. I'm not really sure we want any stuff about God in our report.

Jo: Just a minute, Lizzy. Give her a chance. Go ahead, Tori.

Tori: There's a difference between being smart and being wise. Some people are smart because they are born smart. But real wisdom comes from reading God's Word, the Bible. And the Bible says that the fear of the Lord brings wisdom.

Lizzy: God? The Bible? Smart people? College? Wise people? This is getting confusing.
